Critical Thinking II: Ethical Reasoning Course

Every Wed., starting Sept. 15th to Nov. 3rd, 2021.

Instructor: Dr. Christopher DiCarlo

What is the difference between right and wrong? Or good and evil? What is the good life? What is well-being? What is autonomy? These are difficult and eternal questions that are central to ethical theory, law, bioethics, and political discussion. To explore these concepts in-depth, we will first consider various theories about the nature of value and morality through an introduction to moral philosophy in its various forms, including relativism, natural law, utilitarianism, and more. Then, given that conceptual foundation, the majority of the course will deal with how we can have deeper and more meaningful discussions about specific, important topics such as abortion, genetic engineering, euthanasia, capital punishment, and racism.

July Polling Results: Cutting back the CRB

The Federal Liberal Government will be cutting back by \$800 the CRB (Canadian Recovery Benefit). As of July, instead of \$2000, people who qualify will instead get \$1200. The NDP is demanding the Liberals reverse this decision. Employers are struggling to fill job openings because people are earning more on the CRB, but there are others who are depending on this benefit to survive the pandemic.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau says the federal government will work with provinces to ensure there is an "internationally accepted proof of vaccination" for international travel, but will leave domestic options up to the provincial governments.
