Introducing our Member Profile of the Month: Gerard Corr

I have been a nonbeliever, atheist (specifically agnostic atheist), secularist, and Humanist for a while now. I was eager to find like-minded communities and groups that advocate for secular values, and after some searching, I found Humanist Canada on social media and became a member this year. I was recognized for my entry in Humanist Canada's 2021

student essay contest and began helping as a Social Media Volunteer not long after. I'm super happy to be involved with Humanist Canada, and I'm grateful for the opportunity to help advocate for secularism here in Canada.

I define Humanism as a specific godless and physicalist life philosophy, approach, or outlook. This philosophy starts with the realization that the universe is indifferent to us; humanism begins with the realization that there is no evidence whatsoever to substantiate belief in gods or the supernatural, and as such, human beings must look inwards to solve the problems we face. Secular Humanism is a positive life philosophy that, in light of this realization, takes an approach to life that values ethics, morality, reason, logic, science, and of course, secularism.

I was raised Catholic for most of my life. At around age 16 or 17, I realized, "Hold on, there's no evidence for any of this." I figured that I must have just missed something, so I paid more attention to homilies, church masses, and other religious ceremonies; I read on the topic, and I looked for this evidence that I assumed had just alluded me. Eventually, I realized there wasn't any. This realization didn't make me an atheist overnight; deconstructing the religiosity imprinted on my mind from childhood took a little bit longer than that. It was during my time, in late 2018 that I realized I just didn't believe in any of it anymore.

Every Wed., starting Sept. 15th to Nov. 3rd, 2021.

What is the difference between right and wrong? Or good and evil? What is the good life? What is well-being? What is autonomy? These are difficult and eternal questions that are central to ethical theory, law, bioethics, and political discussion. To explore these concepts in-depth, we will first consider various theories about the nature of value and morality through an introduction to moral philosophy in its various forms, including relativism, natural law, utilitarianism, and more. Then, given that conceptual foundation, the majority of the course will deal with how we can have deeper and more meaningful discussions about specific, important topics such as abortion, genetic engineering, euthanasia, capital punishment, and racism.
