A Statement on Russia's invasion of Ukraine by Humanist Canada's Board of Directors



Humanist Canada joins with citizens worldwide in outrage over the attack that Russia, under the governance of Vladimir Putin, has launched upon Ukraine.

A fundamental principle of modern Humanism is the support of democracy and human rights. To this end, we stand in solidarity with the people of Ukraine who are experiencing incalculable devastation and losses. We stand with the

people in Russia who oppose Putin's war, as well as millions around the world who demand peace. We stand against any form of discrimination amid this crisis and value everyone that calls Ukraine home.

Any solutions must be based on principles that prioritize the dignity and wellbeing of all peoples and the respect of human rights and international law. Rooted in our Humanist principles and by utilizing free inquiry, the power of science, critical thinking and creative imagination for the furtherance of peace and in the service of compassion, we have confidence that we have the means to solve the problems that confront us all. *(The Amsterdam Declaration)*

We call on our members, community leaders, elected representatives, and all Canadians to support a negotiated solution to the Russian invasion of Ukraine. We encourage you to support humanitarian efforts, one of which is the Canadian Red Cross Ukraine Humanitarian Crisis Appeal. The Government of Canada will match donations dollar-for-dollar.

Low-Cost Housing in Canada: Past, Present, and Future



Webinar: Low-Cost Housing in Canada: Past, Present, and Future

With Sarah Cooper, PhD. University of Manitoba

Housing is foundational for both individuals and communities. In the past, Canada's social housing system was recognized around the world as a model for low-cost housing provision. But what happened? In this presentation, Sarah Cooper will review the history and present state of low-cost subsidized housing in Canada, from the public housing heyday of the 1960s to the present National Housing Strategy. She will also offer some potential directions for the future of low-cost housing.

Sarah Cooper is an Assistant Professor in the Department of City Planning in the Faculty of Architecture, University of Manitoba. Her research focuses on housing and social policy, with an emphasis on ensuring access to housing for all. Her current research examines housing for low-income households in Canada, with a focus on the expiry of social housing funding agreements—an issue that will transform the landscape of housing and housing policy in Canada over the next few decades. She approaches her research from a social justice perspective and draws on neoliberal urbanism, settler-colonial theory, and critical housing theory to inform her work.

Prior to completing her PhD at the University of Illinois at Chicago, Sarah worked as a Research Associate and Planner at the Centre for Indigenous Environmental Resources in Winnipeg, and as a researcher at the Manitoba office of the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives. She has worked on a wide variety of research and planning projects, including neighbourhood housing plans, watershed and community plans, and housing and social policy analysis. Join Lindsay van Dijk as she shares with us her exceptional journey to becoming a humanist chaplain in the UK's National Health Service. You'll hear about Lindsay's most memorable moments as a chaplain and why she believes that this career path is

exceptionally powerful.

Lindsay van Dijk has been trained at the Master's level in the Netherlands at the University of Humanistic Studies (Utrecht) to provide humanist and existential counseling, coaching, and pastoral care. Lindsay is accredited as a humanist pastoral carer through the UK Board of Healthcare Chaplaincy (UKBHC), the Non-Religious Pastoral Support Network (NRPSN), and as a humanist funeral celebrant at Humanists UK.

She was the first ever UK-based appointed head of chaplaincy as a humanist in February 2018 and is currently the Head of Chaplaincy at another large NHS Trust. She made national and international headlines and has won several awards for her chaplaincy team since then. She is currently the chair of the NRPSN, supervisor, and trainer at Humanists UK.
